To improve universal access to healthcare by graduating highly competent and confident physician assistants prepared to provide quality, ethical, patient-centered healthcare in a collaborative environment.

Bryant University PA Program Goals

- 1. Provide students with the requisite knowledge, skills, and attitude to navigate a complex and diverse healthcare environment as evidenced by the ability to:
 - a. Obtain medical knowledge and perform physical examinations necessary for patient-centered care
 - b. Apply evidence-based reasoning to the patient's clinical presentation to create an appropriate, individualized treatment plan
 - c. Develop interprofessional communication skills to effectively convey concise and accurate information
 - d. Utilization of appropriate medical diagnostics to aid in diagnosis and treatment, while decreasing unnecessary or extraneous testing
 - e. Master the technical skills of clinical medicine in a safe, supportive, and instructive environment using industry standard and technologically-robust experiential models

The Bryant PA program has a high-tech medical simulation laboratory on site in the program. The medical simulation program is run by the Director of Medical Simulation Education and managed by the Simulation Lab Manager and includes support from all PA program faculty. Students participate in medical simulation activities and standardized patient learning regularly during their didactic phase. The medical simulation component occurs once per term at minimum and assess the student's ability to work in teams effectively, understand the roles of other allied health professionals, utilize resources appropriately and overall communication skills with patients, family members and colleagues.

Clinical year students are evaluated on each clinical rotation by preceptors. Preceptors complete a comprehensive evaluation and assessment of student performance at the culmination of their learning experience. The evaluation tool used is the "Clinical Preceptor Evaluation of Student Performance" survey comprised of 12 questions on a Likert-scale. The average preceptor evaluation scores for the class of 2021-2023 are listed below. The results indicate the program's success in meeting goal # 1.

Method(s) of collection: Preceptor evaluation of student performance on SCPE. 1-5 on a Likert Scale, 5 being "Strongly Agree" and 1 being "Strongly Disagree". Benchmark of 4.5 or 90% established for all elements of the overall program goals.

For Classes 2021-2023, the Bryant PA Program graduates have achieved a greater than 90% pass rate on the PANCE and this exceeds the Program benchmark of maintaining a PANCE pass rate of 90% or greater. The overall PANCE pass rate for the past several cohorts has been 100%. The 5-year national PANCE pass rate is 94% and the Bryant PA program 5-year PANCE pass rate is 93% (this includes pending score report information for the class of 2023 as of 08/2023).

The graduate survey additionally gathers information on employment. For Classes 2021-2023, 30% graduates remain in Rhode Island to practice and overall, 30% of all graduates from these cohorts work in a primary care setting.

- 2. Prepare our students to meet the needs of all populations within the current health-care system by:
 - a. Incorporating patient-centered, ethical medical education throughout the curriculum
 - b. Providing a strong primary-care based education as well as clinical experiences in underserved communities
 - c. Highlighting an awareness of healthcare economics, potential barriers to accessing care and solutions to reduce healthcare disparities
 - d. Supporting diverse perspectives and interprofessional approaches to healthcare that best serve the needs of diverse patient populations



In the didactic phase of the curriculum, students receive education on patient-centered care embedded throughout all courses and education on ethics in PA 534 Medical Ethics and Law. The didactic curriculum is geared towards providing comprehensive medical education in all body systems to prepare students for practice in primary care and specialty medical practices. The clinical medicine curriculum adheres to the NCCPA blueprint guidelines.

Students learn about healthcare economics, access issues and disparities in PA 524 Public Health and Dental Medicine. Additionally, students begin pre-clinical experiential work at both Clinica Esperanza and the Rhode Island Free Clinic in the didactic phase of the program and continue throughout clinical year. Both clinics provide the students with exposure to underserved communities, barriers to receiving healthcare and real-world experience working with practitioners and patients to find and implement solutions to healthcare disparities.

The curricular design and content of each course meets program goal # 2. This is reinforced by data obtained by graduates on the graduate survey.

Bryant PA students are required to complete 20 weeks of supervised clinical practice experience in primary care settings (family medicine, outpatient internal medicine, pediatrics, emergency medicine) throughout the clinical phase of the program. The number of clinical hours, patient logs and recorded diagnoses seen across the lifespan are consistent with the most commonly managed conditions in primary care settings. Students log hours, encounters, patient demographics, diagnoses and procedural skills are logged in Exxat and monitored by the program to ensure sufficient exposures are obtained.

Students are placed in 8 core rotations and 2 elective rotations in a variety of settings that reflect the diversity of the Rhode Island state population. Students are also afforded the opportunity to complete clinical rotations in American Samoa and the U.S. Virgin Islands for further exposure to diverse populations. Within all settings, students work in collaboration with all levels of allied health care professionals.

The results of "Clinical Preceptor Evaluation of Student Performance" survey for Classes of 2021-2023 demonstrates the program's ability to meet goal # 2.

The program has identified through the graduate survey and through review of adjunct lecturer lists that graduates have entered post-graduate PA program fellowships or residencies and returned to the Bryant PA program as either guest lecturers or clinical preceptors after obtaining sufficient real-world clinical experience.

- 100% participation in offered local CME events by students in cohorts 2021-2023.
- 100% participation in volunteer "trauma weekend experience" by students in cohorts 2021-2023.
- 7 graduates entered postgraduate residency or fellowship training in cohorts 2021-2023.
- 15 graduates from the classes of 2021-2022 have returned to the program to participate in physical examinations and clinical skills labs.
- 56 graduates in total have returned to assist in PA didactic or clinical education at Bryant University.
